The MAG Institute for Excellence in Medicine and the Medical Association of Georgia greatly appreciate the essential funding received from the Georgia Trauma Commission to support the MAG Medical Reserve Corps (MAG MRC). The MAG MRC responds to declared emergencies in the state, including natural disasters and disease outbreaks. We would now like to request a grant of \$170,000 that will be used to...

- Conduct classroom training and drills (e.g., responding to mass casualty events, deploying mobile field hospitals, shelter deployments, practicing aero-medical evacuation, radio comms)
- Expand the MAG MRC distance training program and make it available to other MRC units
- Purchase supplies and equipment as needed
- Conduct training events in "Stop the Bleed" hemorrhage control techniques
- Increase the number of MAG MRC volunteers
- Outfit MAG MRC volunteers with uniforms and supplies
- Maintain a K-9 Team for disaster response and conduct a training program
- Onboard new helicopter Landing Zone Team members and conduct a training program
- Onboard new Drone Team members and conduct a training program
- Facilitate networking among public and private sector partners and stakeholders with MAGMRC and DPH

The MAG MRC is in a constant state of recruitment and retention. MAG MRC provides its members with a uniform and gear. The cost to outfit one volunteer is approximately \$800.

MAG Institute for Excellence in Medicine, Inc. FY2024 Georgia Trauma Commission Grant Application

The Medical Association of Georgia Medical Reserve Corps (MAG MRC) received federal approval as a medical reserve corps in 2015. The MAG MRC is part of a state and national network of medical reserve corps. There are nearly 1,000 community-based MRC units and 200,000 MRC volunteers in the U.S. and its territories, including 19 MRC units in Georgia.

The MAG MRC is prepared to respond to declared emergencies in the state, deploy and staff mobile field hospitals and support emergency shelters under the direction of the Georgia Department of Public Health. The MAG MRC complements the official medical, public health, and emergency services resources in the state.

The MAG MRC has over 100 volunteers, either ready to deploy or in process of becoming deployable. Of those, 65% are physicians, and a full 88% are health care professionals or medical students. Recruitment and retention of volunteers is an ongoing and vital aspect of maintaining a ready and effective volunteer force.

MAG MRC is actively involved with medical schools and nursing schools. Our goal is to provide training opportunities otherwise not typically available to the students and to help foster among them an appreciation for donating their time and expertise to the community.

The MAG MRC requires its volunteers to register with the 'State Emergency Registry of Volunteers in Georgia' (SERVGA) system and complete a training and credentialing process to become members. The MAG MRC conducts regular classroom training and drills (e.g., personal preparedness, disaster management, mental health field response, responding to mass casualty events, deploying mobile hospitals, and practicing aero-medical evacuation including safe management of the landing zone).

The MAG MRC responds to declared emergencies in the state, including natural disasters and disease outbreaks.

The MAG MRC's notable achievements include...

- Being prepared to deliver physician and non-physician volunteers to all major disasters that occur in the State of Georgia
- Provided a team of 24-hour on-call physicians to provide support to GDPH shelters throughout Georgia during the 2019 Hurricane Dorian declared emergency
- Responded to requests for assistance in erecting mobile surgical facilities in 2020 at Wellstar Kennestone Hospital and Emory University Hospital Midtown in preparation for an anticipated influx of Covid-19 patients.
- Created a pool of nearly 300 physician and related health care professionals for the 2020 Covid-19 response and provided wellness support to GA and GA DoD amounting to \$1,022,000 in economic benefit to the State of Georgia over a two-month deployment period
- Created a pool of 58 physicians to act as medical evaluators to two GEMA mass vaccination sites in 2021, providing an economic benefit to the State of Georgia in the amount of \$205,000 over a three-month deployment
- Increased the number of volunteers with each succeeding year
- Formed resident physician, medical student, and nursing student teams
- Received state and national awards and recognition
- Recognized in articles and radio broadcasts
- Taught STB to security staff and key personnel of Atlanta's four major sports and event venues (SunTrust Stadium, Georgia World Congress Center, State Farm Arena, Mercedes Benz Stadium)
- Taught STB to a combined Secret Service / DOJ terrorism symposium hosting nearly 300 law enforcement and private security personnel from across the state.
- Planned and led a multi-agency mass casualty training event in Warner Robins. Participating
 agencies included MAG MRC, Trinity School of Medicine, Central Georgia Technical College
 School of Nursing, 116 MDG GAANG, Warner Robins PD, Warner Robins, FD, Central Georgia
 Technical College PD, GMR Air Ambulance, Georgia State Patrol.

- In 2022, supported the Warner Robins PD by providing physicians and safety officers for their multi-agency mass casualty, active shooter training exercise.
- Upcoming, conduct Active Shooter/STB CME training for physicians at the 2022 MAG House of Delegates.

Upcoming training includes:

- Joint Drone Team and Landing Zone Team training
- Proper radio communications

- K-9 Team medical first aid
- Personal Preparedness

The MAG Institute for Excellence in Medicine and the Medical Association of Georgia greatly appreciate the essential funding that it receives from the Georgia Trauma Commission (GTC) to support the MAG MRC.

The first GTC grant in 2015 was used to establish the MAG MRC program and provide uniforms, equipment, and training for the leadership group. Subsequent GTC grants have been used to recruit, outfit and train MRC volunteers.

The MAG MRC is requesting a \$170,000 grant in FY2024 to support its recruiting, retention, education, and training efforts. The MAG MRC will use these funds for equipment, uniforms, medical supplies, and operational and administrative costs. A robust training schedule is planned for the upcoming year. The MAG Board of Directors fully endorses the MAG MRC program. The MAG MRC leadership team has developed the following budget request for the period of July 2023 to June 2024.

- MAGMRC issued a stand-down order to all volunteers on May 21st and discontinued the daily noon meetings.
- MAGMRC leadership team reduced the 5:00PM meetings to weekdays only after stand-down

June

- MAGMRC leadership team 5:00PM meetings reduced to bi-weekly; discontinued after June 10th
- Due to COVID-19 restrictions, MAGMRC postponed all planned training events for the foreseeable future

July
